Trafficking in Human Beings in Romania

The present research analyses only official data reported by EUROASTAT and Romania, showing that **National Agency against Human Trafficking** (the Romanian authority that collects all data regarding THB and reports them to international organizations and national authorities) **reports partial data regarding the total number of the Romanian victims**: about 50% for 2010-2016 and about 30% for 2017 and 2019.

The report uses comparative EUROSTAT and national data published by the National Agency against Human Trafficking.


2020 EUROSTAT - Trafficking in Human Beings Report

- In 2017 and 2018 the largest number of victims registered in EU (2.880 victims 1.527 for 2017 and 1.353 for 2018) has Romanian origins (pg. 26)
- For the same period of time **ANITP reported only 1.159** victims (662 in 2017, 497 in 2018), including states of destination outside EU
- Data reported by the Romanian Agency represents about 40% of the total number reported by EUROSTAT.

După cum am arătat la începutul acestui raport, t**raficul intern** rămâne preponderent, o proporţie semnificativă dintre victime, cu precădere minore, fiind exploatate, în anul 2018, pe teritoriul României (244).

497 victims are reported by ANITP for 2018, but there is information in its annual report about a **minimum of 533.**

The national ANITP report sates that 289 Romanian victims are reported as coming from the **top 10 EU countries** of destination and 244 are reported as exploited in Romania.

So, a minimum of 533 victims should have been reported by ANITP for 2018, instead of 497.




Figura 1. Dinamica anuală a populației victimelor, în perioada 2007-2017

Așa cum menționam la începutul *Raportului*, **traficul intern** rămâne preponderent, o proporție semnificativă dintre victime, cu precădere minore, fiind exploatate, în anul 2017, pe teritoriul României (401).

Județele sursă, cu cel mai mare număr de victime domiciliate în aria geografică/ administrativă au fost: Dolj, Iasi, Sibiu, Galati, Prahova, Neamt (între 5,2% - 10,2% din totalul victimelor). Interesant este faptul că aceleași județe, cu sensibile variații procentuale, ocupă primele locuri în clasamentul județelor în care victimele au fost recrutate (5,5% - 11,7%) și exploatate (7,2% - 13,7%).




Figura 8. Principalele țări de destinație a exploatării victimelor identificate în anul 2017.


The national ANITP report sates that 339 Romanian victims are reported as coming from the **top 10 EU countries** of destination and 401 are reported as exploited in Romania.

So, a minimum of 740 victims should have been reported by ANITP for 2017, instead of 662.

- Between 2010-2012 the largest number of victims registered in EU were from Romania 6 101 Romanian victims were identified
- For the same period of time **ANITP reported only 3 243** (1154 victims in 2010, 1048 in 2011, and 1041 in 2012), including states of destination outside EU
- Data reported by the Romanian Agency represents less than 50% of the total number reported by EUROSTAT.





The national ANITP report sates that 878 Romanian victims are reported as coming from abroad and 355 are reported as exploited in Romania.

So, a minimum of 1.233 victims should have been reported by ANITP for 2015, instead of 880.



Infringement Procedure against Romania

Treaty of Romania's accession to the European Union, signed on April 25, 2005 in Luxembourg

"Through the Accession Treaty, the constitutive treaties of the Union become an integral part of the Romanian legislation.

Under the conditions of accession to the European Union, the principle of the supremacy of Community law over national law will apply in Romania. The Accession Treaty is directly applicable to all citizens of Romania, creating both rights and obligations for them."

Annex IX of the Accession Treaty

"Chapter 24 - Justice and Home Affairs: Specific commitments assumed and requirements accepted by Romania at the conclusion of the accession negotiations of December 14, 2004"

(Pct. 7) To develop and implement a coherent multiannual strategy against crime, including concrete actions to reduce Romania's status of country of origin, transit and destination of victims of human trafficking and to present **annually credible statistics** on how this criminal phenomenon is controlled.
